







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### Spay Neuter Clinic

Operations at the Spay & Neuter Clinic transitioned to a new veterinary provider in July upon Dr. Courtney's retirement. The new veterinary contractor team is now in place and responsible for daily operations at the Spay Neuter Clinic. Reports about surgeries performed at the clinic will be provided on a quarterly basis going forward. A new addition to the report this month is the numbers of pets from our county sterilized through the \$20 FIX program for pets of income-qualified families. This important program ensures affordable spay/neuter services are accessible to all of our citizens regardless of income.
